long war in Ukraine entails incredible challenges — millions of displaced people, refugees and conflict-affected people who need support; thousands of destroyed buildings that need to be repaired; thousands of square kilometres of land contaminated with explosive ordnance that need to be cleared. Following the escalation of the conflict in 2022, the Danish Refugee Council significantly expanded its work in Ukraine, and it is now one of the largest DRC responses in the world. There are many numbers in this brochure, but behind each of them are the lives of people who have found themselves in extremely difficult conditions due to shelling and fighting. Many of them have lost everything and have to start their lives from scratch, and we are there to ensure that everyone affected by displacement can live a dignified life.

# ₩ Protection

#### Lviv, Ivano-Frankivsk, Volyn, Chernivtsi Oblasts

- 3,559 people's needs, risks and vulnerabilities were assessed and monitored through 1,307 household interviews. As a part of community protection monitoring 23 focus group discussions were organised.
- Various individual protection assistance was successfully delivered to 129 people in need (cash support for family reunification, provision of necessary medical equipment, etc.). Additionally, 294 persons were supported through referrals to other DRC units or other humanitarian organisations that could provide appropriate specific assistance.
- 2,048 people benefitted from organised psychosocial support (PSS). 40 mothers attended structured sets of PSS sessions.
- 654 participants increased their awareness of how to access services through general protection information sessions.
- **32** displaced and non-displaced people enhanced their knowledge and skills by participating in Community-Based Protection training programmes.

#### Legal Aid

#### 2 Lviv, Ivano-Frankivsk, Volyn Oblasts

- 2,115 people were informed of their rights and entitlements through individual legal counseling. Additionally, 22 people were supported through referrals to other DRC units or other humanitarian organisations that could provide specific assistance.
- 92 people were supported in obtaining documentation or legal status.
- 1,231 people benefitted from legal aid group information sessions.
- **25** youths participated in awareness-raising activities on their rights and entitlements to employment.
- DRC organised one roundtable event in Lviv on social and legal protection challenges of internally displaced people (IDP) with disabilities in need.

DRC's implementing partners in Volyn, Ivano-Frankivsk, Ternopil, Khmelnytskyi, Lviv, and Zakarpattia Oblasts:

- Provided 8,206 people with individual legal services (legal counseling, administrative support, assistance with court cases, etc.).
- Raised awareness of 6,679 people on their rights and entitlements.

#### ■ Capacity Building Programme

#### 2 Across all western area

- **Five** civil society organisations (CSOs) based in western Ukraine were supported with capacity-building interventions to increase their ability and the effectiveness and efficiency of their humanitarian response to people in need.
- Staff members of **30** CSOs benefitted from capacity-building measures to enhance their professional skills.
- **Seven** online training sessions were conducted for CSOs on a range of topics: Core Humanitarian Standards; Protection Mainstreaming; Data Protection Management; Effective Communication and Networking; Monitoring and Evaluation; Leadership and Project Management; Fundraising and Grant Proposal Writing.
- **Six** online experience-sharing and networking sessions were held to strengthen horizontal coordination and foster cooperation between CSOs across different areas in the West of Ukraine.
- Three women's CSOs in Kyiv and Lviv Oblasts got grants for socioeconomic initiatives. Under the project, 40 women have already attended professional courses (manicurist, eyebrow artist, or confectioner) and got the opportunity to start their own business or build a new career.
- The Capacity Building team also started a series of knowledge exchange meetings for Kyiv and Lviv women's CSOs (topics: prevention of professional burnout, networking, data management, time management, delegation of responsibilities in the team, etc.).

# Economic Recovery

#### Across all western area

- DRC supported 22 small & medium enterprises and four agro-businesses across western Ukraine through grants and material assistance.
- 36 micro-business grants were provided.
- 14 people received vocational educational grants to improve professional skills and increase competitiveness in the labour market.

#### Non-food Items (NFI) Distribution

#### Lviv, Chernivtsi Oblasts

- 8,891 family hygiene kits and 826 hygiene kits for children were distributed.
- To meet the additional needs through the winter season, 700 winter clothing sets for children, 4,436 thermal blankets, and 318 combined solar lamps/ power banks were distributed.
- 22 complex hygiene kits were distributed to collective centres and institutions, and 250 kits with folding beds with linens were distributed to collective centres in Chernivtsi Oblast.

#### Cash Support

#### 2 Lviv, Ivano-Frankivsk, Volyn, Chernivtsi Oblasts

- DRC supported 7,983 people with multipurpose cash assistance for three months to help them meet their basic needs
- 885 school-age children received cash for education in Lviv, Ivano-Frankivsk, and Volyn Oblasts.

### Shelter & Settlements

#### 2 Lviv, Ivano-Frankivsk, Volyn Oblasts

- 799 people (276 households) received cash-for-rent assistance for six months in Lviv Oblast.
- 209 people (97 households) received cash for shelter repair assistance in Lviv Oblast following damage to their homes caused by missile strikes.
- DRC rehabilitated seven collective centres hosting 476 IDP in Lviv, Ivano-Frankivsk, and Volyn Oblasts to create safer and more dignified living conditions for displaced people, including those with disabilities. The types of works included the installation of energy-efficient windows and repairs of heating systems to reduce heat loss during winter; renovation of toilet and shower facilities; repair of water supply and sanitation systems to ensure appropriate hygiene and sanitation conditions; as well as waterproofing

of premises, maintenance of power supply and ventilation systems, and essential interior decoration.

# Humanitarian Disarmament and Peacebuilding

#### Across all western area

• **12** explosive ordnance (EO) victims were reached through targeted individual assistance.

The DRC activities in the western area were possible thanks to the financial support of the European Union, the United States Agency for International Development, Switzerland through the Swiss Agency for Development and Cooperation, the Ministry for Foreign Affairs of Finland, UK aid from the UK government, the Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Denmark, and the Ole Kirk's Fond. Humanitarian aid activities in Ukraine are also supported through means donated by private foundations and individuals primarily in Denmark.

#### **② Chernihiv, Sumy Oblasts**

- 3,044 people's needs, risks and vulnerabilities were assessed and monitored through household interviews, 1,123 households' needs were surveyed, and eight rapid protection assessments were conducted.
- Individual protection assistance was successfully delivered to **55** people in need.
- 253 people attended protection group information sessions.
- **1,272** people participated in PSS sessions.

#### Legal Aid

#### Kyiv, Chernihiv, Sumy Oblasts

- 314 people obtained legal consultations.
- 305 people benefitted from legal aid group information sessions.
- Over 200 legal leaflets were disseminated.

DRC's implementing partners in Chernihiv and Sumy Oblasts:

• Provided **2,728** people with individual legal services (legal counseling, administrative support, assistance with court cases, etc.)

- Raised awareness of **3,491** people on their rights and entitlements.
- **4,491** copies of **four** information materials were designed and distributed among the conflict-affected population.

#### Capacity Building Programme

#### **Chernihiv Oblast**

- Partner CSOs provided **51,419** people with humanitarian aid to cover their basic needs (e. g. food sets, hygiene kits, clothes, medicines, etc.).
- 12 CSOs based in Ukraine's north were supported with capacity-building measures to increase their ability and the effectiveness and efficiency of their humanitarian response to people in need.
- 129 CSO staff members benefitted from capacity-building measures to enhance their professional skills.
- 80 individual online psycho-social counselling sessions were held for ten CSOs' representatives and improved their mental health and emotional state.
- 112 individual online mentorship sessions were held for 14 CSOs' representatives and enhanced their professional abilities and skills to better implement their humanitarian-oriented programme activities.
- **Eight** online training sessions were conducted for CSOs that focused on Core Humanitarian Standards, Protection Mainstreaming, Data Protection Management, Effective Communication, Monitoring and Evaluation, Leadership and Project Management, Fundraising and Grant Proposal Writing and Dialogue Facilitation.
- Eight online experience-sharing and networking sessions were held to strengthen horizontal coordination and foster cooperation between CSOs.

- In the Boromlia Village Council building that was damaged due to the shelling, new windows and a door were installed.

- **Four** collective centres are being repaired in Sumy city and Trostianets town.

#### 2 Dnipropetrovsk, Zaporizhzhia Oblasts

- 2,507 people's needs, risks, and vulnerabilities were assessed and monitored through 1,042 household interviews.
- 1,422 people have participated in psycho-social recreational sessions.
- Individual protection assistance was provided to 77 people with disabilities, elderly at risk, and people with severe medical conditions.
- **168** people were supported by receiving referrals to other DRC units or other organisations that could provide targeted aid (e. g. cash or legal assistance, protection support of assistive devices, and child protection support of case management, etc.).
- **218** people attended protection info sessions on how to obtain disability status and affordable medicine programmes.
- **17** Gender-Based Violence (GBV) awareness sessions were held for **306** vulnerable women and girls.

• **30** women were provided with cash assistance within GBV case management.

#### 

- 373 household assessments were provided (including 817 people) and monitored through household surveys to understand the protection landscape and protection risks, concerns, and needs.

#### **P**Legal aid

#### 2 Dnipropetrovsk, Zaporizhzhia Oblasts

- 1,247 people received individual legal counseling.
- **417** internally displaced people attended **67** legal aid info sessions on housing, land & property, social welfare, digital (online) services, and documentation.
- Through legal case management, 13 people were able to recover their documents, and title documents for real estate, and obtain an extract from information databases and documents confirming legally significant facts such as work experience, birth, death, etc.

#### Skharkiv, Donetsk Oblasts

- 444 people were reached through legal information sessions.
- 292 people of concern were provided with legal support.

DRC's implementing partners in Dnipropetrovsk, Zaporizhzhia, Kharkiv, and Poltava Oblasts:

- Provided 5,659 people with individual legal services (legal counseling, administrative support, assistance with court cases, etc.).
- Raised awareness of 4,890 people on their rights and entitlements.
- Designed and distributed 8,938 copies of 24 leaflets and other information materials.

#### **EXECUTE:** Capacity Building Programme

#### Kharkiv, Zaporizhzhia, Dnipropetrovsk Oblasts

- Eight CSOs based in the eastern area (three in Kharkiv, two
  in Dnipro, and three in Zaporizhzhia) were pre-selected for
  capacity-building to increase their ability, effectiveness and
  efficiency of their humanitarian response (focus on protection
  activity) to people in need.
- A one-day workshop for **five** CSOs in Dnipro was organised to improve and expand their activities.

#### ② Donetsk Oblasts

 A three-month partnership with one CSO was established to respond to acute emergencies such as missile strikes or severe weather conditions. The CSO has started the distribution of 400 family kits with NFIs and 400 hygiene kits to households in need in hard-to-reach areas.

#### Cash Support

#### Kharkiv, Donetsk Oblasts

- 3,404 households and 6,847 people received cash support in Kharkiv Oblast (Pechenizhska, Tsyrkunivska, Starosaltivska, Chuhuivska, Chkalovska, Vilhivska, Merefianska, Pesochinska, Krasnogradska, Novovodolazhska, Balakliiska hromadas) and Donetsk Oblast (Kramarorsk, Druzhkivka hromadas).
- 510 households will be registered under its Cash for Fuel initiative in Oskal, Mykolayivka, Iziuimska hromadas, and in Donetsk Oblast to support households with winterisation resilience.

#### Dnipropetrovsk Oblast

- 5,794 people (2,075 households) received cash support Apostolivska, Dnipro, Kamianska, Kryvorizka, Novooleksandrivska, Pavlogradska, Pidhorodnenska, Solonianska, Synelnykivska, Zhovtovodska hromadas.

#### **№** Kharkiv Oblast

- The Shelter team worked with the CSO to carry out a non-technical assessment in Derhachi and Shevchenkove hromadas. As a result, approximately 400 households were selected for light and medium rehabilitation
- **166** households were registered for window repairs in response to the 6th of October missile strike in Kharkiv city.
- 94 households were registered for window repairs in the northeast of Kharkiv city, where the highest level of damage was recorded after the siege of the city during the beginning of the escalation of the conflict in February 2022.
- 11 collective centres hosting internally displaced people were selected, and rehabilitation is ongoing to improve the living conditions of approximately 1,730 people and create capacity to host additional an 560 IDP.

#### **② Mykolaiv, Kherson, Odesa Oblasts**

- In Kherson Oblast, the Protection team conducted a rapid protection assessment.
- The needs, risks, and vulnerabilities of 1,895 people were meticulously evaluated and confirmed through protection monitoring conducted across 723 households in both Kherson and Mykolaiv Oblasts.
- General protection activities significantly heightened awareness about GBV among 789 people through information sessions.
- The team extended individual protection assistance to 76 people who were identified through ongoing protection monitoring and provided cash for protection to 169 people in need.
- A total of 156 successful referrals were facilitated, spanning various crucial topics such as multi-purpose cash assistance (MPCA), shelter, NFIs, and legal services.
- GBV pre-assessment visits were conducted in five hromadas in Mykolaiv Oblast.

#### Legal Aid

#### Mykolaiv, Kherson Oblasts

- 710 people received qualified information about their rights and obligations through individual legal consultations.
- **16** people received support in obtaining the necessary documents or court protection.
- **1,261** people used the services of group information sessions of legal aid.

DRC's implementing partners in Mykolaiv and Odesa Oblasts:

- Provided 1,888 people with individual legal services (legal counselling, administrative support, assistance with court cases, etc.).
- Raised awareness of 3,636 people on their rights and entitlements.

#### Capacity Building Programme

#### ② Odesa, Mykolaiv Oblasts

- Supported implementation partners that provide free legal aid in Odesa and Mykolaiv.

#### Mykolaiv Oblast

- **764** hygiene kits for internally displaced people were distributed in Barativka and Novosvitlivka villages in Mykolaiv Oblast.
- 1,834 large family hygiene kits were distributed among internally displaced people in Mykolaiv Oblast (Stepove, Mykolaiv, Mishkovo-Pogorilove, Vynohradivka, Lotskyne, Buzke, Starohorozhene, Pervomaysk, Voznesensk, Barativka).
- 619 sets of NFIs and kitchen utensils were distributed among the affected population in Dmytrivka, Ochakiv, Halytsynove, and Mykolaiv.
- 667 hygiene kits were distributed among the floodaffected and conflict-affected population in Dmytrivka, Ochakiv, Bila Krynytsia, Snihurivka, Halytsynove, and Mykolaiv.
- 514 kits for emergency house repairs were distributed in hromadas, villages, and cities in Mykolaiv Oblast affected by artillery and/or missile attacks. After the missile attack on Stepove village, DRC urgently provided support to affected people.

#### Kherson Oblast

- **Seven** extra-large kits were distributed among the flood-affected population in Kherson city.
- **486** kits for emergency house repairs were distributed in hromadas, villages, and cities of Kherson Oblast affected by artillery and/or missile attacks.

#### Cash Support

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- Due to the destruction of the Kakhovka dam, the Mykolaiv office set up four emergency teams that provided MPCA, protection activities (legal, information sessions) and mine awareness sessions at the hospital of Kherson, at the bus/train stations of Mykolaiv city and flood- affected villages of Mykolaiv Oblast. From June to July, the teams provided MPCA to 1,824 people in Kherson Oblast and 1,928 people in Mykolaiv Oblast.
- The Basic Needs and Shelter teams distributed cash among **850** flood-affected households in Kherson city allowing them to conduct emergency repairs.
- MPCA was provided to 569 conflict-affected people in Mykolaiv Oblast.

### Shelter & Settlements

#### Mykolaiv, Kherson Oblasts

- Conducted non-technical assessments on 1,765 objects throughout the city and oblast, in partnership with local CSOs.
- Pre-assessment and technical assessment visits were conducted in **five** hromadas in Mykolaiv Oblast and one hromada in Kherson Oblast.
- 100,000 m<sup>2</sup> of plywood and tools were provided to Mykolaiv City Council to protect buildings damaged by the conflict.
- 50 reverse osmosis stations were installed and provided safe access to filtered water to citizens of Mykolaiv. At maximum capacity, the total capacity of purified water production is 47,500 litres per hour. The training has been organised for the capacity building of municipal staff responsible for the maintenance and operation of the stations.
- A total of 83 water pumps of different sizes and purposes, and two aeration systems for water treatment have been provided to the Vodokanal (Water Department) of Mykolaiv City and installed to restore the water network within the district.
- Procured over 44 kilometres of pipes for restoration and maintenance of water provision, wastewater, and

heating networks, in close collaboration with Mykolaiv City Council and Vodokanal.

- Equipment for collective centres was provided to the Mykolaiv Oblast Administration with the goal of furbishing spaces such as collective or transit centres
- Rehabilitation works for apartments and houses started in the Mykolaiv and Kherson Oblasts. A total of 980 conflictaffected households will be supported with repairs through contractors, while an additional 195 households will be assisted through a cash-for-shelter modality in Kherson, in response to the floods caused by the Kakhovka dam collapse in early June.
